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Management's Discussion and Analysis

Introduction:

The following discussion and analysis of the financial performance and activity of Labette Community College (The College) is to provide an introduction to and an understanding of the basic financial statements of the College for the year ended June 30, 2019, with selected comparative information for the year ended June 30, 2018. This discussion focuses on the current activities, resulting changes, and currently known facts. This discussion should be read in conjunction with the College's basic financial statements and the footnotes to those financial statements. The College is solely responsible for the completeness of this information. A separate audit is issued for the Labette Community College Foundation and Alumni Association.

Using the Annual Report:

The audit is conducted in accordance with auditing standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing standards, specifically GASB 34/35, issued by the Comptroller of the United States. The purpose of GASB 34/35 is to make the financial statement presentation of public entities more closely resemble or emulate that of non-public for-profit enterprises. The hope is that it will "enhance the understandability of the general purpose external financial reports." To that end the annual financial report will include basic financial statements and required supplementary information.

Basic financial statements are comprised of two parts:

- 1. Basic Financial Statements These include Statement of Net Position; Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position; Statement of Cash Flows. These statements present the results on a single measurement focus and basis of accounting.
- 2. The Notes to the Basic Financial Statements are an integral and essential portion of the financial statements.

Required Supplementary Information:

Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) - This is information that is required by standards to be presented, but is not part of the basic financial statements.

Highlights to the Financial Statements:

Labette Community College completed the fiscal year which ended June 30, 2019 at approximately the same financial position as the previous year. At year end, the College's total assets exceeded its liabilities by \$14,839,559. Of this amount, \$3,719,265 is classified expendable or unrestricted net position. These unrestricted assets may be used to meet the College's ongoing obligations. For 2019 net current position (current assets less current liabilities) increased \$78,624. The coverage ratio of current assets to current liabilities (the ability to pay current liabilities from current assets) remained at approximately the same level 2.55 in 2018 and 2.58 in 2019. Overall cash and cash equivalents decreased by \$206,415 to \$4,320,316. Despite challenges over the last few years we have been able to keep the reserves at approximately the same level. The College's overall debt is at a low level of \$242,000.

Statement of Net Position


The statements of net position present the assets, liabilities, and net position of the College at June 30, 2019. The purpose of the statements of net position is to present the financial condition of the College.

The assets and liabilities are categorized between current and noncurrent. Noncurrent assets are externally restricted cash and investments restricted to make debt service payments, maintain sinking or reserve funds, or to purchase or construct capital or other noncurrent assets, such as capital assets. Noncurrent liabilities include (1) principal amounts of revenue bonds payable, notes payable, and capital lease obligations with contractual maturities greater than one year; (2) estimated amounts for accrued compensated absences and other liabilities that will not be paid within the next fiscal year; or (3) other liabilities that although payable within one year, are to be paid from funds that are classified as noncurrent assets.

The College's current assets consist primarily of cash, short-term investments and accounts receivables, while noncurrent assets consist mainly of capital assets. The total breakdown of assets between current and noncurrent classification is as follows:



Total assets increased by \$135,412 and the net position increased by \$43,521.




Of the \$16,501,412 in total assets, approximately 26% is in cash and cash equivalents, receivables, and investments. Capital assets represent 74% of total assets.

The liabilities are categorized between current and noncurrent. For example, the College's current liabilities consist primarily of accounts payable, accrued liabilities, deferred revenue and agency funds held for college clubs and organizations. The noncurrent liabilities portion is comprised of notes payable and capital leases payable.


Comparison of Assets to Liabilities



Labette Community College Management's Discussion and Analysis For the year ended June 30, 2019

Total liabilities decreased \$178,933 from \$1,840,786 in 2018 to \$1,661,853 while total assets increased \$135412 from \$16,636,824 to \$16,501,412. The asset to liability ratio held steady from 9.04 (\$16,636,824/\$1,840,786) to 9.93 (\$16,501,412/\$1,661,853). Assets exceeded liabilities by \$14,839,559.

Net position is presented in three major categories. The first is invested in capital assets, net of related debt, which represents the College's equity in its property, plant, and equipment. The second is restricted and the third is unrestricted. The net position increased during the current fiscal year from \$14,796,039 to \$14,839,559 which was a \$43,520 increase. Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position

The statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position present the College's financial results for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019. The statement includes the College's revenue and expenses, both operating and non-operating.

Operating revenues and expenses are those for which the College directly exchanges goods and services. Non-operating revenues and expenses are those that exclude specific goods and services. Examples of non-operating revenues would be County property tax revenue and state aid; whereby local and state taxpayers do not directly receive goods and services from the College.


Results of Operations Fiscal Year 2019

Revenue

Components and sources of revenue:

Labette Community College receives revenue from five major sources. They are: The State of Kansas; Federal Government (including Pell Grants); students, in the form of tuition and fees; local taxpayers, by way of property taxes; and through business style auxiliary enterprises. These sources are relatively stable year over year as a percentage of the total.



Statement of Cash Flows

The statement of cash flows presents information about cash receipts and cash payments during the year. It helps assess the College's ability to generate net cash flows and to meet its obligations as they come due. The largest sources of cash from operating activities were student tuition and fees, federal financial aid, and sales and services of auxiliary enterprises. Major uses of cash were payments made to employees and vendors. In 2019 overall, cash and cash equivalents decreased by \$206,415 to \$4,320,316.

Labette Community College Management's Discussion and Analysis For the year ended June 30, 2019

Capital Assets and Debt Administration

During the year ended June 30, 2019, capital assets increased \$69,664 bringing the capital assets net of accumulated depreciation to \$11,362,294. The college's long term debt decreased during the year \$207,298 bringing the total long-term debt to \$242,000.

Summary of Overall Performance

Labette Community College's financial condition was impacted by a number of factors in 2019 not limited to:

- State funding
- Property tax changes in assessed valuation
- Declining enrollment
- Declining high school population
- The declining state of the Kansas economy
- Dwindling long term debt

Through all of this the College's financial position has stayed at approximately the same level this past year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Labette Community College, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2019, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise Labette Community College's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the College's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the College's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of Labette Community College, as of June 30, 2019, and the respective changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages i-vii be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise Labette Community College's basic financial statements. The supplementary information, as listed in the table of contents as pages 27 to 40, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance), and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

We also previously audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the basic financial statement of "Municipality", Kansas as of and for the year ended June 30, 2018 (not presented herein), and have issued our report thereon dated January 14, 2019, which contained an unmodified opinion on the basic financial statement. The 2018 basic financial statement and our accompanying report are not presented herein, but are available in electronic form from the web site of the Kansas Department of Administration at the following link http://www.admin.ks.gov/offices/chieffinancial-officer/municipal-services. The 2018 actual column (2018 comparative information) presented in the individual fund schedules of regulatory basis receipts and expenditures—actual and budget for the year ended June 30, 2019 (Schedules 3 to 7, as listed in the table of contents) is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statement. Such 2018 comparative information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2018 basic financial statement. The 2018 comparative information was subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the 2018 basic financial statement and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2018 basic financial statement or to the 2018 basic financial statement itself, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the 2018 comparative information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the

basic financial statement as a whole for the year ended June 30, 2018, on the basis of accounting described in Note 2.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 18, 2019, on our consideration of Labette Community College's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended June 30, 2019

1. NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

The financial statements of Labette Community College, Parsons, Kansas, have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board is the principal standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the College's accounting policies follow.

Reporting Entity

The financial reporting entity consist of the primary government, organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that exclusion could cause the financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

Component Unit

The component unit section of the financial statements includes the financial data of the discretely presented component unit, the Labette Community College Foundation and Alumni Association. The component unit is reported separately to emphasize that it is legally separate from the College. The economic resources received or held by the component unit are held almost entirely for the direct benefit of the College. The Labette Community College Foundation and Alumni Association was formed to promote and foster the educational purposes of the College, and to create a fund to be used for any program, project or enterprise undertaken in the interest of the College. The Foundation acts largely as a fundraising organization, soliciting, receiving, managing and disbursing contributions on behalf of the College. Most of the contributions received are designated by the donors to be used for specific purposes or by specific departments. In these instances, the Foundation serves essentially as a conduit. Contributions that are not designated are used where the need is considered greatest, as determined by the Foundation board of directors. The Foundation can sue and be sued, and can buy, sell, or lease real property. The Foundation's financial statements should be included with the College's financial statements. Separate audited financial statements are prepared and are available at the Foundation, and can be requested from the College's controller. The Foundation is considered a component unit.

The College's component unit is a private not-for-profit organization that reports under FASB standards. As such, certain revenue recognition criteria and presentation features are different from GASB revenue recognition criteria and presentation features. No modifications have been made to the component unit's financial information in the College's financial report for these differences. The component unit's financial data has, however, been aggregated into like categories for presentation purposes.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

For financial reporting purposes, the College is considered a special-purpose government engaged only in business-type activities. Accordingly, the College's financial statements have been prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under the accrual basis, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded when an obligation has been incurred. All significant intra-agency transactions have been eliminated.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the College considers all highly liquid investments with an original maturity date of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investments

The College accounts for its investments at fair value. Changes in unrealized gain (loss) on the carrying value of investments are reported as a component of investment income in the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets.

Accounts Receivable and Deferred Revenue

Accounts receivable consist of tuition and fee charges to students and auxiliary enterprise services provided to students, faculty and staff, the majority of each residing in the State of Kansas. Accounts receivable also includes amounts due from the Federal government, state and local governments, or private sources, in connection with reimbursement of allowable expenditures made pursuant to the College's grant and contracts. Accounts receivable also include taxes in process of collection for property taxes assessed and collected for the calendar year ending December 31, 2017.

In accordance with governing state statutes, property taxes levied during the current year are a revenue source to be used to finance the budget of the ensuing year. Taxes are assessed on a calendar year basis and become a lien on the property on November 1st of each year. The County Treasurer is the tax collection agent for all taxing entities within the County. Property owners have the option of paying one-half or the full amount of the taxes levied on or before December 20th during the year levied with the balance to be paid on or before May 10th of the ensuing year. State statutes prohibit the County Treasurer from distributing taxes collected in the year levied prior to January 1st of the ensuing year. Consequently, for revenue recognition purposes, taxes levied during the current year are not due and receivable until the ensuing year. Property taxes levied in December 2017 are recorded as taxes receivable. Approximately 2% to 7% of these taxes are normally distributed after June 30, 2019, and are presented as accounts receivable-taxes in process and deferred revenue to indicate that they are not appropriable. It is not practicable to apportion delinquent taxes held by the County Treasurer at the end of the year and, further, the amounts thereof are not material in relationship to the financial statements taken as a whole.

Inventories

Inventories consist of books and supplies held for resale in the bookstore and are valued at cost, using the first-in, first-out method (FIFO).

Noncurrent Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents that are externally restricted to make debt service payments, maintain sinking or reserve funds, or to purchase or construct capital or other noncurrent assets, are classified as noncurrent assets in the statement of net assets.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Capital Assets

Capital assets are stated at cost at the date of acquisition, or fair value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. For equipment, the College's capitalization policy includes all items with a unit cost of \$2,500.00 or more, and an estimated useful life of greater than one year. Renovations to building, infrastructure, and land improvements that significantly increase the value or extend the useful life of the structure are capitalized. Routine repairs and maintenance are charged to operating expense in the year in which the expense was incurred. Depreciation is provided on straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the respective classes of property. Estimated useful lives are as follows:

Accounts Receivable and Allowance for Doubtful Accounts

The College regularly extends unsecured credit to various students. The College uses the allowance method to account for uncollectible accounts receivable.

Compensated Absences

Employee vacation pay is accrued at year-end for financial statement purposes. The liability and expense incurred are recorded at year-end as accrued vacation payable in the statement of net assets, and a component of compensation and benefit expense in the statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets.

Noncurrent Liabilities

Noncurrent liabilities include (1) principal amounts of revenue bonds payable, notes payable, and capital lease obligations with contractual maturities greater than one year; (2) estimated amounts for accrued compensated absences and other liabilities that will not be paid within the next fiscal year; or (3) other liabilities that although payable within one year, are to be paid from funds that are classified as noncurrent assets.

Net Position

The College's net position are classified as follows:

Invested in Capital Assets, Net of Related Debt: This represents the College's total investment in capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation, and outstanding debt obligations related to those capital assets. To the extent debt has been incurred but not yet expended for capital assets, such amounts are not included as a component of investment in capital assets, net of related debt.

Restricted Net Position – Expendable: Restricted expendable net position include resources in which the College is legally or contractually obligated to spend resources in accordance with restrictions imposed by external third parties.

Restricted Net Position – Nonexpendable: Nonexpendable restricted net position consist of endowment and similar type funds in which donors or other outside sources have stipulated, as a condition of the gift instrument, that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity, and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income, which may either be expended or added to principal.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Net Position (Continued)

Unrestricted Net Position: Unrestricted net position represent resources derived from student tuition and fees, state appropriations and sales and services of educational departments and auxiliary enterprises. These resources are used at the discretion of the governing board to meet current expenses for any purpose. These resources also include auxiliary enterprises, which are substantially self-supporting activities that provide services for students, faculty, and staff.

When an expense is incurred that can be paid using either restricted or unrestricted resources, the College's policy is to first apply the expense towards restricted resources, and then towards unrestricted resources.

Income Taxes

The College, as a political subdivision of the State of Kansas, is excluded from Federal income taxes under Section 115(1) of the Internal Revenue Code, as amended. The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(C)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Classification of Revenues

The College has classified its revenues as either operating or nonoperating revenues according to the following criteria:

Operating revenues: Operating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of exchange transactions, such as (1) student tuition and fees, net of scholarship discounts and allowances, (2) sales of services of auxiliary enterprises, net of scholarship discounts and allowances, and (3) most Federal, state and local grants and contracts, and Federal appropriations.

Nonoperating revenues: Nonoperating revenues include activities that have the characteristics of nonexchange transactions, such as gifts and contributions, and other revenue sources that are defined as nonoperating revenues by GASB No. 9, Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Government Entities that use Proprietary Fund Accounting, and GASB No. 34, such as state appropriations and investment income.

Scholarship Discounts and Allowances

Student tuition and fee revenues, and certain other revenues from students, are reported net of scholarship discounts and allowances in the statements of revenues, expenses, and changes in net assets. Scholarship discounts and allowances are the difference between the stated charge and the goods and services provided by the College, and the amount that is paid by students and/or third parties making payments on the students' behalf. Certain governmental grants, such as Pell grants, and other Federal, state or nongovernmental programs, are recorded as either operating or nonoperating revenues in the College's financial statements. To the extent that revenues from such programs are used to satisfy tuition and fees and other student charges, the College has recorded a scholarship discount and allowance.

Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Pension Plan

Substantially all full-time College employees are members of the State of Kansas Public Employees Retirement System which is a multi-employer state-wide pension plan. The College's policy is to fund all pension costs accrued; such costs to be funded are actuarially determined annually by the State.

Budgetary Information

Kansas statutes require that an annual operating budget be legally adopted for current funds - unrestricted and plant funds (unless specifically exempted by statute). The statutes provide for the following sequence and timetable in the adoption of the legal annual operating budget:

- 1. Preparation of the budget for the succeeding fiscal year on or before August 1st.
- 2. Publication in local newspaper of the proposed budget and notice of public hearing on the budget on or before August 5th.
- 3. Public hearing on or before August 15th, but at least ten days after publication of notice of hearing.
- 4. Adoption of the final budget on or before August 25th.

The statutes allow for the governing body to increase the originally adopted budget for previously unbudgeted increases in revenue other than ad valorem property taxes. To do this, a notice of public hearing to amend the budget must be published in the local newspaper. At least ten days after publication the hearing may be held and the governing body may amend the budget at that time. There were no such budget amendments for this year.

The statutes permit transferring budgeted amounts between line items within an individual fund. However, such statutes prohibit expenditures in excess of the total amount of the adopted budget of expenditures of individual funds.

Annual operating budgets are prepared using the cash basis of accounting, modified further by the recording of accounts payable and encumbrances. Revenue is recognized when cash is received. Expenditures include cash disbursements, accounts payable, and encumbrances. Encumbrances are commitments by the municipality for future payments and are supported by a document evidencing the commitment, such as a purchase order or contract. All unencumbered appropriations (legal budget expenditure authority) lapse at year-end.

A legal operating budget is not required for a Current Fund – Agency Funds.

Spending in funds which are not subject to the legal annual operating budget requirement are controlled by federal regulations, other statutes, or by the use of internal spending limits established by the governing body.

3. STEWARDSHIP, COMPLIANCE, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Compliance with Kansas Statutes

Supplementary Schedules 3 to 7 have been prepared in order to show compliance with the cash basis and budget laws of Kansas. Based upon these schedules, the College was in apparent compliance with Kansas cash basis and budget laws.

4. **DEPOSITS**

Primary Institution:

K.S.A 9-1401 establishes the depositories which may be used by the College. The statute requires banks eligible to hold the College's funds have a main branch or branch bank in the county in which the College is located and the bank provide an acceptable rate of return on funds. In addition, K.S.A. 9-1402 requires the banks to pledge securities for deposits in excess of FDIC coverage. The College has no other policies that would further limit interest rate risk.

K.S.A 12-1675 limits the College's investment of idle funds to time deposits, open accounts, and certificates of deposit with allowable financial institutions; U.S. Government securities; temporary notes; no-fund warrants; repurchase agreements; and the Kansas Municipal Investment Pool. The College has no investment policy that would further limit its investment choices.

Concentration of credit risk. State statutes place no limit on the amount the Government may invest in any one issuer as long as the investments are adequately secured under K.S.A. 9-1402 and 9-1405.

Custodial credit risk – deposits. Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the College's deposits may not be returned to it. State statutes require the College's deposits in financial institutions to be entirely covered by federal depository insurance or by collateral held under a joint custody receipt issued by a bank within the State of Kansas, the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, or the Federal Home Loan Bank of Topeka. All deposits were legally secured at June 30, 2019.

At year-end, the College's carrying amount of the deposits was \$4,304,216.72 and the bank balance was \$4,530,381.76. The bank balance was held by one bank resulting in a concentration of credit risk. Of the bank balance, \$250,000.00 was covered by FDIC insurance and \$4,280,381.76 was collateralized with pledged securities held by the pledging financial institutions' agents in the College's name.

Component Unit:

At year-end, the Foundation's carrying amount of the deposits including certificates of deposit was \$1,822,592.61 and the bank balance was \$1,773,941.01. The bank balance was held by three banks and two investment companies resulting in a concentration of credit risk. Of the bank balance, \$1,761,894.08 was covered by FDIC insurance and the remaining \$12,046.93 was covered by SIPC insurance.

5. INVESTMENTS

Component Unit:

Investment Policy

The Primary objective of the Foundation's investment policy is to provide for long-term growth of principal and income within reasonable risk on continuing and consistent basis. Emphasis shall be on maintaining growth of assets, net of inflation and fees. Over a period of time, the minimum goal for the total return of the fund should be the current rate of inflation plus 3 to 7%.

The investment objective requires a disciplined and consistent management philosophy. The objectives do not call for a philosophy which represents extreme positions or opportunistic styles. The portfolio shall be diversified with both fixed income and equity holdings. The purpose of such diversification is to provide reasonable assurance that no single security or class of securities will have a disproportionate impact of the total portfolio.

Investments are made under the direction of the Board of Directors. Equity investments and other investments are recorded at fair values subject to comments on Investments under the summary of accounting policies.

6. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

Component Unit:

The framework for measuring fair value provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to measure fair value. The hierarchy gives the highest priority to unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities (level 1) and the lowest priority to unobservable inputs (level 3). The three levels of the fair value hierarchy under FASB ASC 820 are described as follows:

Level 1. Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Foundation has the ability to access.

Level 2. Inputs to the valuation methodology include:

- quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets;
- quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets;
- inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability;
- inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.
- If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3. Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The asset or liability's fair value measurement level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of any input that is significant to the fair value measurement. Valuation techniques used need to maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at June 30, 2019.

U.S. government securities: Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities.

Corporate Bonds: Valued using pricing models maximizing the use of observable inputs for similar securities. This includes basing the value on yields currently available on comparable securities of issuers with similar credit rates.

16. OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

Description of Pension Plan

The College participates in a cost-sharing multiple-employer pension plan (Pension Plan), as defined in Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 67, *Financial Reporting for Pension Plans*. The Pension Plan is administered by the Kansas Public Employees Retirement System (KPERS), a body corporate and an instrumentality of the State of Kansas. KPERS provides benefit provisions to the following statewide pension groups under one plan, as provided by K.S.A. 74, article 49:

- Public employees, which includes:
 - o State/School employees
 - o Local employees
- Police and Firemen
- Judges

Substantially all public employees in Kansas are covered by the Pension Plan. Participation by local political subdivisions is optional, but irrevocable once elected. Those employees participating in the Pension Plan for the College are included in the State/School employee group.

KPERS issues a stand-alone comprehensive annual financial report, which is available on the KPERS website at www.kpers.org.

Special Funding Situation

The employer contributions for the College, as defined in K.S.A. 74-4931 (2) and (3), are made by the State of Kansas on behalf of the College. Therefore, the College is considered to be in a special funding situation as defined by GASB Statement No. 68. Accordingly, the State is required to recognize its proportionate share of the net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources and expense for the pension plan attributable to the College. The College records revenue and pension expense in an amount equal to the expense recognized by the State on behalf of the College.

16. OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (Continued)

Benefits

Benefits are established by statute and may only be changed by the General Assembly. Members with ten or more years of credited service, may retire as early as age 55, with an actuarially reduced monthly benefit. Normal retirement is at age 65, age 62 with ten years of credited service, or whenever a member's combined age and years of service equal 85.

Monthly retirement benefits are based on a statutory formula that includes final average salary and years of service. When ending employment, members may withdraw their contributions from their individual accounts, including interest. Members who withdraw their accumulated contributions lose all rights and privileges of membership. For all pension coverage groups, the accumulated contributions and interest are deposited into and disbursed from the membership accumulated reserve fund as established by K.S.A. 74-4922.

Members choose one of seven payment options for their monthly retirement benefits. At retirement a member may receive a lump-sum payment of up to 50% of the actuarial present value of the member's lifetime benefit. His or her monthly retirement benefit is then permanently reduced based on the amount of the lump sum. Benefit increases, including ad hoc post-retirement benefit increases, must be passed into law by the Kansas Legislature. Benefit increases are under the authority of the Legislature and the Governor of the State of Kansas. For all pension coverage groups, the retirement benefits are disbursed from the retirement benefit payment reserve fund as established by K.S.A. 74-4922.

Contributions

Member contributions are established by state law, and are paid by the employee according to the provisions of Section 414(h) of the Internal Revenue Code. State law provides that the employer contribution rates are determined based on the results of an annual actuarial valuation. The contributions and assets of all groups are deposited in the Kansas Public Employees Retirement Fund established by K.S.A. 74-4921. All of the retirement systems are funded on an actuarial reserve basis.

For fiscal years beginning in 1995, Kansas legislation established statutory limits on increases in contribution rates for KPERS employers. Annual increases in the employer contribution rates related to subsequent benefit enhancements are not subject to these limitations. The statutory cap increase over the prior year contribution rate is 1.2% of total payroll.

The actuarially determined employer contribution rates and the statutory contribution rates for school employees are 16.38% and 12.01%, respectively. KPERS has multiple benefit structures and contribution rates depending on whether the employee is a KPERS 1, KPERS 2 or KPERS 3 member. KPERS 1 members are active and contributing members hired before July 1, 2009. KPERS 2 members were first employed in a covered position on or after July 1, 2009 and KPERS 3 members were first employed in a covered position on or after January 1, 2015. Effective January 1, 2015, Kansas law established the KPERS member-employee contribution rate of 6% of covered salary for KPERS 1, KPERS 2 and KPERS 3 members.

16. OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (Continued)

Employer and Nonemployer Allocations

Although KPERS administers one cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan, separate (sub) actuarial valuations are prepared to determine the actuarial determined contribution rate by group. Following this method, the measurement of the collective net pension liability, deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources, and pension expense are determined separately for each of the following groups of the plan:

- State/School
- Local
- Police and Firemen
- Judges

To facilitate the separate (sub) actuarial valuations, KPERS maintains separate accounts to identify additions, deductions, and fiduciary net position applicable to each group. The allocation percentages presented for each group in the schedule of employer and nonemployer allocations are applied to amounts presented in the schedules of pension amounts by employer and nonemployer.

The individual employer allocation percentages for the pension amounts were based on the ratio of the employer and nonemployer contributions for the individual employer in relation to the total of all employer and nonemployer contributions of the group.

At June 30, 2018, the proportion recognized by the State of Kansas on behalf of the College was .0011%, which was an decrease of .1212% from the proportion measured at June 30, 2017.

Net Pension Liability

At June 30, 2018 and 2017, the proportionate share of the net pension liability recognized by the State of Kansas that was attributable to the College was \$7,733,090.00 and \$8,218,664.00, respectively.

Actuarial Assumptions

The total pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of December 31, 2017, which was rolled forward to June 30, 2018, using the following actuarial assumptions:

Mortality rates were based on the RP 2014 Mortality Tables, with age setbacks and age set forwards as well as other adjustments based on different membership groups. Future mortality improvements are anticipated using Scale MP-2016.

The actuarial assumptions used in the December 31, 2017 valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study conducted for the period January 1, 2013, through December 31, 2015. The experience study is dated November 18, 2016.

16. OTHER POST EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS (Continued)

The long-term expected rate of return of pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class as of the most recent experience study, dated November 18, 2016, as provided by KPERS' investment consultant, are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate: The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.75%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that contributions from plan members will be made at the current contribution rate and that contributions from school districts will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Revenue and Pension Expense Recorded by the College: For the year ended June 30, 2019, the College recognized revenue and pension expense in an equal amount of \$756,638.95.

As provided by K.S.A. 12-5040, the local government allows retirees to participate in the group health insurance plan. While each retiree pays the full amount of the applicable premium, conceptually, the local government is subsidizing the retirees because each participant is charged a level of premium regardless of age. However, the cost of this subsidy has not been quantified in these financial statements.

Under the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA), the government makes health care benefits available to eligible former employees and eligible dependents. Certain requirements are outlined by the federal government for this coverage. The premium is paid in full by the insured. There is no cost to the government under this program.

17. COMPENSATED ABSENCES

Administrators and professional staff hired to work 12 months per year on a one-half time or more basis, earn vacation time according to the following schedule:

0 to 4 years of service – 12 workdays per year 5 + years of service – 20 workdays per year
```

Administrators and professional staff hired to work 9 to 11 months per year on a one-half time or more basis will not be granted vacation time. Instead of vacation, they will be granted four personal days per contract year that may be used in the same manner as vacation.

Vacation leave and personal days may be accumulated to a maximum of 30 days. At the termination of employment, the employee will be compensated at their current rate of pay for earned but unused vacation or personal days.

The provision for and accumulation of sick leave is based upon employment classification and years of service. Employees are not paid for accumulated sick leave upon termination.

The College accrues a liability for compensated absences which meet the following criteria:

- 1. The College's obligation relating to employees' rights to receive compensation for future absences is attributable to employees' services already rendered.
- 2. The obligation relates to rights that vest or accumulate.
- 3. Payment of the compensation is probable.
- 4. The amount can be reasonably estimated.

In accordance with the above criteria, the College has accrued a liability for vacation and personal days and not recorded a liability for sick leave which has been earned, but not taken, inasmuch as the amount cannot be reasonably estimated.

18. EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLANS

The College has a 403(b) plan available for its employees. An employee is eligible to participate from the date of hire. The College will match contributions of up to \$40.00 per month or \$480.00 per year to the plan. Employer contributions will vest according to the following schedule:

Total contributions made by the College into the plan on behalf of the employees for the year ended June 30, 2019, was \$55,272.74.

19. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time, although the College expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

20. RISK MANAGEMENT

The College is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employee; employees' health and life; and natural disasters. The College manages these risks of loss through the purchase of insurance policies.

21. CONCENTRATION OF RISK

Component Unit:

12.17% of the Foundation's monies are invested in corporate bonds and US treasury securities. The effect in the future on the Foundation's portfolio is unknown and is subject to market economic conditions.

22. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Labette Community College Foundation and Alumni Association was formed to promote and foster the educational purposes of the College, and to create a fund to be used for any program, project, or enterprise undertaken in the interest of the College. The Foundation acts largely as a fund raising organization, soliciting, receiving, managing, and disbursing contributions on behalf of the College. Most of the contributions received are designated by the donors to be used for specific purposes or by specific departments. In these instances, the Foundation serves essentially as a conduit. Contributions that are not designated are used where the need is considered greatest, as determined by the Foundation's board of directors. The Foundation collected capital campaign money and disbursed to the College for the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, \$20,500.00 and \$40,750.00, respectively. The Foundation disbursed to the College for the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, \$114,299.95 and \$107,994.74, respectively for scholarships. The College disbursed on behalf of the Foundation donated services and facilities, as discussed in footnote 12, for the years ended June 30, 2019 and 2018, \$83,661.35 and \$79,663.66, respectively.

The Foundation has entered into an operating lease with Labette Community College for the lease of the Cherokee County Campus, which the Foundation owns, with a rental of \$121,000.00 per year from July 1, 2008, to June 30, 2019, renewable annually. Amounts collected in fiscal year ended June 30, 2019, was \$121,000.00. On June 25, 2019 the College signed a capital lease agreement with the Foundation to acquire the Cherokee County Campus, see note 10 and 14 for additional information.

Report on Compliance for Each Major Federal Program

In our opinion, except for the noncompliance described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, Labette Community College complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on the Student Financial Assistance Programs Cluster for the year ended June 30, 2019.

In our opinion, Labette Community College complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its other major federal programs identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs for the year ended June 30, 2019.

Other Matters

Labette Community College's response to the noncompliance findings identified in our audit is described in the accompanying Corrective Action Plan. Labette Community College's response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of compliance and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

Report on Internal Control over Compliance

Criteria:

When a recipient of Title IV grant or loan assistance withdraws from an institution during a payment period or period of enrollment in which the recipient began attendance, the institution must determine the amount of Title IV earned by the student as of the student's withdrawal date. If the total amount of Title IV assistance earned by the student is less than the amount that was disbursed to the student or on his or her behalf as of the date of the institution's determination that the student withdrew, the difference must be returned to the Title IV programs. If the amount the student earned is greater than \$50 of the amount disbursed, the difference between the amounts must be treated as a post-withdrawal disbursement (34 CFR 668.22(a)(1) through (a)(5)).

Condition:

During the testing of 37 student files in the return of Title IV funds, we noted two instances where the R2T4 was completed for a student that did not receive any aid, three instances where the R2T4 was completed incorrectly either resulting in an under or overpayment of the amount to return, one instance where the repayment was not completed within 45 days, and one instance there was no documentation of the student's withdrawal.

Effect:

The institution could have kept Federal funds longer than allowed by Title IV regulations.

Cause:

A turnover in staff resulting in the College not having the proper training in the process of the return of title funds and there is no formal process in place for the school to report when a student withdraws to the financial aid office.

Recommendation:

Policies and procedures should be written to ensure time information is provided to the financial aid office and accurate information is used in calculating amounts on R2T4 forms. We recommend the College establish a self-assessment by reviewing a sample of student files and recalculating and testing calculation inputs.

Views of responsible officials and planned corrective action: Policies and Procedures have been written to provide control over return of Federal funds. The registrar has been giving the responsibility of reporting withdraw student to the financial audit office and financial aid staff have received training in the area of the return of funds.
