



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Executive Summary

The purpose of the five year program review is to evaluate the viability and quality of a particular program and institute a process to improve services to our students and supporting constituency. The Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) program received a five (5) year initial accreditation in 2012 from the Commission on the Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE). Shortly thereafter, the director resigned and unfortunately due to no staffing there was not a PTA class offered for the 2015/2016 academic year. Furthermore, CAPTE accreditation requires 85% ultimate pass rate over 2 years. This caused CAPTE to request additional information in May of 2016, make recommended changes and required compliance reporting.

Dr. Jimmie Wilson was hired as the new PTA Program Director in January of 2016. He has extensive knowledge in rehabilitation services that spans into Kansas, Missouri, and Arkansas. He also holds a license to practice in each of these states. He serves on the board of directors for the Missouri Physical Therapy Association. Dr. Wilson promptly started re-organizing, re-developing, and moving the program forward. Trent McGown was hired in May of 2016 as the Academic Clinical Coordinator of Education. He also brings a wealth of knowledge from the field as he is a former graduate of the LCC PTA program, and is certified to practice in Kansas. In addition to Dr. Wilson and Mr. McGown, Dr. Lisa Farris, DPT teaches in the program. Dr. Farris has 19 years of experience in a variety of different settings. All employees meet the CAPTE requirements for instruction in a PTA program.

It was vital to Dr. Wilson and the college to move the program forward for our communities served, as the Bureau of Labor Statistics ranks PTA as the 8th most job in demand from 2016-2026, with an estimated growth of 30% in this same time period. It is estimated that students graduating the PTA program have the potential to earn a salary between \$46,920 to \$57,620.

While re-establishing the program, Dr. Wilson ran into some initial difficulties with constituency cooperation because of their prior experience with the program and no class offerings. Classes did resume however in the 2016/2017 academic year under the direction and oversight of the new staff. The number of students in this first class offering with the new staff was held to a minimal number to allow for continued, successful growth in both the faculty and program. The program has since increased the number of students in the PTA program making LCC very comparable to other PTA student enrollment numbers in Kansas (ranging between 15-25). LCC PTA accepted sixteen (16) students in 2016 and twenty-three (23) students were accepted in 2018. CAPTE approved our twenty-three (23) seat class maximum for enrollment, and would need to approve any further increases. CAPTE accepts a minimum of two (2) full-time instructors but recommend three (3).

While the faculty critiqued their own first and second year greatly, they gathered a lot of data to implement future changes along the way. The most recent change, August 2018, surrounds student retention by requiring a formal, documented remedial training to

students who may be struggling within the program. The combined, per CAPTE, FY17 and FY18 student NPTE pass rate average is 70.9%. Those passing the board exam have a 100% job placement rate.

Dr. Wilson and staff have built strong relationships with a variety of different organizations in the field. They have a strong base foundation for clinical sites and all students have been hired upon graduation of the program. Currently, PTA has 30 agreements in place for clinical site usage. The variety of locations are throughout Kansas, Missouri, and Oklahoma.

In October of 2017, the PTA program underwent a planned CAPTE onsite review process for re-accreditation. On July 24, 2018 the CAPTE commission met and awarded Labette Community College PTA program a 10 year accreditation for the program with no compliance reporting. It shall be noted this is the maximum length that can be awarded to an institution.

Dr. Wilson and staff's successful rebuilding of this program can be validated by the program receiving a full 10 year accreditation with no compliance reporting mandates, and an average student graduation rate of 91%. There was full-student program enrollment for FY2018, and currently there are over 30 PTA agreements made with institutions providing locations for our students to further learn about the job field.

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ACADEMIC PROGRAM/DISCIPLINE REVIEW Labette Community College

Introduction to Program

A. Program Relation to College Mission, Core Values, and Strategic Plan

Labette Community College provides quality learning opportunities in a supportive environment for success in a changing world. The Physical Therapist Assistant (PTA) Program supports this mission. Our goal is to prepare our PTA graduates to be competent to work in any setting where physical therapy services are provided. The world of health care and rehabilitation is in a constant state of change and improvement. The program addresses this challenge by keeping up-to-date through the use of current textbooks, journal readings, conferences, and relevant clinical exposure. To meet these challenges we stress the need for continuous learning by our students. We work to acquire clinical settings that are meeting these challenges and provide a great, hands on learning experience for our students.

B. Program Recognition/Accreditation

The PTA program received a 5 year initial accreditation in 2012 from the Commission on the Accreditation in Physical Therapy Education (CAPTE). After the initial accreditation the program struggled with achieving the CAPTE standard for pass rate on the national exam. In 2015, the program director that started the program resigned. As a result of not having the required faculty for the program, no class was accepted for the 2015/2016 academic year. When new faculty was hired, the program moved forward with a class for the academic year of 2016-2017. This combination of events led CAPTE to request for additional information to determine the status of the program. The document was submitted and the program remained accredited with a request for the program to submit compliance reports that addressed concerns of the commission. CAPTE concerns included qualified faculty and lower than required pass rates. The compliance reports informed CAPTE of the changes and the plans for the program. These changes were accepted and continued accreditation was granted.

In October of 2017, the PTA Program underwent a planned onsite review by CAPTE for re-accreditation. The onsite team stated they would recommend accreditation. The commission met on July 24, 2018 and granted a 10 year accreditation for the program with no compliance reports requested. This is the maximum amount of time allotted for accreditation.

C. Program/Discipline Demand/Need

According the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BOLS), PTA is currently ranked as the 8th most job in demand from 2016-2026. PTA has a projected growth of 30-31% during that ten year period. The mean salary range on the BOLS ranges from \$46,920-\$57,620 (Table 1 below). Several companies contact the program frequently to post job opportunities in the region and nation

Our region has several PTA programs. The number of students in each of the programs is very comparable. Programs at Ozark Technical College (OTC), Hutchinson Community College (HCC), and Kansas City Kansas Community College (KCKCC) admit 2 cohorts per year. North East Oklahoma A & M (NEO) and Colby Community College (CCC) has one cohort per year.



D. Summary Statement of Faculty Qualifications (appendix B)

According to CAPTE the program director must have:

- A minimum of master's degree,
- Hold a current license/certification to practice as a PT or PTA in any United States jurisdiction,
- A minimum of five years full time, post licensure experience that includes a minimum of three years of clinical experience, didactic or clinical teaching experience, experience in administration/management, and
- Experience in education theory and methodology, instructional design, student evaluation and outcome assessment, including the equivalent of nine credit hours in educational foundations.

The program director, Jimmie Wilson, meets all of the above criteria. He earned his master's degree from the University of Central Arkansas followed by completion of a doctoral degree from the University of Kansas. Dr. Wilson has worked in a wide range of settings from rural hospital and Home Health to major medical centers. He has worked in acute care and rehabilitation centers. Dr. Wilson was the director of rehabilitation services for a large regional medical center for 6 years. Dr. Wilson is currently licensed to practice in Kansas, Missouri, and Arkansas. He has been a member of the American Physical Therapy Association for 26 years. He currently serves on the board of directors for the Missouri Physical Therapy Association. He is also a member of the Kansas Physical Therapy Association. Dr. Wilson has completed 9 credit hours in the area of educational foundations to meet the CAPTE requirement.

The CAPTE requirements for the Academic Clinical Coordinator of Education are as follows:

- A PT or PTA that holds a license or certificate in any jurisdiction of the United States,
- Has a minimum of three years full time post-licensure clinical experience, and
- A minimum of two years of clinical practice as a Clinical Coordinator of Education or a Clinical Instructor, or two years of experience in teaching.

Trent McGown, CPTA is the clinical coordinator for the PTA program. Mr. McGown is a graduate of the LCC PTA program in 2014 and holds a certificate to practice in Kansas. He has just under two years clinical experience at Coffeyville Regional Hospital. While at the hospital, he worked in a variety of setting and gained valuable experiences. He developed excellent clinical skills. Mr. McGown's credentials and experience was impressive, even though did not meet CAPTE minimum requirement for years of experience. The program director consulted with CAPTE to develop a professional development plan that would be acceptable to CAPTE. The plan called for Mr. McGown to attend an APTA sponsored clinical instructor certification course and become a certified clinical instructor. He was also required to acquire a total of 1920 hours of additional clinical experience. Mr. McGowen was hired as the clinical coordinator at LCC and he was granted release time to acquire these hours. Mr. McGown meet all CAPTE requirements in May 2018.

CAPTE requires that the collective academic faculty of the PTA program include an effective blend of individuals who possess the appropriate educational preparation and/or professional experiences sufficient to meet program goals and expected student outcomes as related to program mission and institutional expectations and assigned program responsibilities. In addition to the program director and clinical coordinator, the program has one adjunct instructor for the fall and spring semester. Currently one instructor is filling this role for both of these semesters. Dr. Lisa Farris DPT has 19 years of experience in a wide variety of settings. Dr. Farris works full time at Labette Health as a staff physical Therapist. She has certifications in the areas neurological rehabilitation and in women's health. She provides pediatric rehabilitation. Dr. Farris has been an adjunct instructor for the PTA program for every graduating class. She provides valuable instruction and experience to the PTA Program.

F. How Does the Discipline Use Professional Development?

Most of our professional development funds are acquired from Perkins Grant. As a member of the board of directors for the Missouri Physical Therapy Association, Dr. Wilson acquires free attendance to all conferences developed by this organization. This has provided a wide array of educational opportunities. Dr. Wilson utilizes Perkin's funds to attend the KPTA spring conference. The PTA faculty attends the spring conference with the PTA class. While supervising the students at the conference the faculty attends a variety of courses. These courses allow the faculty to remain current with interventions and issues impacting the field of Physical Therapy. This education is also required to maintain licensure for the state of Kansas.

Trent McGown attends the fall KPTA conference to acquire education on a variety of topics that allows him and the program to remain current in the field of Physical Therapy. Any acquired information is brought back and shared with the program faculty and students.

We had adequate Perkin's funds to send Mr. McGown to Combined Sections Meeting sponsored by the APTA in 2018. This meeting typically provides information specifically for educators in the field of Physical Therapy. The conference provides updates on education requirements and seeks input from schools for needed changes. He attended the conference in New Orleans in 2018. At this conference, he attended a training session regarding the national test and obtained information on how to write more rigorous test questions.

The program director and clinical coordinator believe attendance by both instructors at this annual conference would provide extremely valuable resources for the PTA program.

G. Student Enrollment

1. Number of students admitted to the program/declared majors and program completers and transfer/licensure rates.

The maximum number of students that can be accepted into the program is 23. The program has been near capacity for most of the academic years since development. In 2016, the program had no faculty, therefore no students were accepted. The number of students accepted in the fall of 2016 was kept low due to the new faculty not having any formal experience in the classroom. In the fall of 2017, a number of qualified applicants were declined and 18 students were accepted, but 1 student did not attend. The current class of fall of 2018 began with 22 students.

As noted previously, the program had been notified by CAPTE in 2016 and 2017 to address the pass rates for the national exam due to not meeting the CAPTE standard. The standard requires an average of 85% for a two year period. This issue started as a result of the very low pass rate of 2014. Several

factors can be discussed for the cause, but in part this was due to selection of students with lower total points earned in the application process. Points are assigned to application components. These components include GPA of prerequisite courses, TEAS test score, hand written essay, and program interview to identify some of these areas.

The 2015 pass rate improved but substantial extra efforts were made outside of classroom to facilitate this achievement. Several attempts to pass the national exam were made by this class. The new incoming program director assisted these students with supplemental study plans to assist the student in passing. The 2017 pass rate is lower than desired but the two year average meets CAPTE requirements. In the 2017 class, eleven of the students were originally selected to be in the 2016 class that was cancelled. Some of these students had lower scores with their GPA and on the TEAS test which are used as part of the selection process. The scores for 2017 in part are also due to inexperienced faculty. With that said the scores are improved as compared to those of the 2014 class.

In the fall of 2017, the new faculty had acquired one year of experience and more knowledge and involvement in the selection process of students. The graduating class of 2018 consisted of 16 students. 15 students took the NPTE on July 10th and achieved a first attempt pass rate of 60%. The students who did not pass on their first attempt plan to test again in October of 2018. The program faculty has contacted this group of students and provided structured study plans for them to utilize. Students have up to 6 attempts to take the exam. First attempt passing is very important because each student attempt has a total cost of \$550.

2. What recruiting and retention strategies are used by the program/discipline?

The PTA program promotes the program through social media, recruitment trips to high schools, and career fairs. The PTA program is also promoted on the LCC website and the LCC catalog. Placement of our students in clinical sites throughout the region also serves as marketing the program in those areas. The PTA program has also worked with public relations to promote community awareness of the program through all forms of traditional advertising. These events include participation in the fall festival, community balance screenings, and discussing the program on Cardinal Corner. The faculty also promotes the program when at state and national conferences. The program staff contacts all students who complete a request for information with an interest in the PTA program.

The PTA faculty monitors each student's progress and grades very closely during the program. If a student demonstrates any sign of difficulty, the faculty will intervene with the student to identify options to help the student. This can include additional study and practice time with the instructor to assist with study habit and skills. Suggestions may be made for the student to work with a classmate who has a good understanding of the material. Students may also be referred to the Student Success Center to receive assistance as well. A variety of options are provided to help the student succeed if at all possible.



CAPTE requires that the collective academic faculty of the PTA program include an effective blend of individuals who possess the appropriate educational preparation and/or professional experiences sufficient to meet program goals and expected student outcomes as related to program mission and institutional expectations and assigned program responsibilities. CAPTE also requires that a program must have at least 2 full time employees. CAPTE has discussed requiring at least 3 full time employees in the future for a program of this size.

The program director's position description allows a maximum of 10 credit hours per semester and maximum of 25 credit hours per year. The clinical coordinator position description has a maximum of 8 credit hours per semester for a maximum of 24 credit hours per year.





Describe other assessment data/summaries if appropriate.

The PTA class of 2017 started with 3 of the 4 instructors being new. The size of the class was limited to 17 students to allow for the new instructors to develop their teaching skills. The first time pass rate for this group was 56.3% which was a decline as compared to the 2015 class. The instructors for the 2013 cohort and 2017 cohort were in their first year of classroom instruction. The first time pass rate for 2013 was 45% and for 2017 was 56% respectively. This was a step in the right direction. The ultimate pass rate currently for the class of 2017 is 81.3%.

Several changes have been implemented with the new PTA faculty. PTA practice test scores comparison between the 2017 and 2018 class is demonstrating an average increase of 25 points for the 2018 class.

On 7/10/18, 15 of the 16 students took the NPTE with a first attempt pass rate of 9 of 15 students for 60%. One student did not take the test and plans to test in October. 3 of the 6 that did not pass, scored above 590. The required score to pass is 600. As a result, the program will need all but 2 graduates to pass the NPTE to maintain the 85% 2 year average for pass rates. The program has reached out to the students who did not pass and provided a structured study and review plan.

The program implemented immediate changes that will be in effect starting the academic year of 2018-2019. These changes include the following:

- 1. Must maintain a test average of 80% or higher for each course prior to taking the final.
- 2. The minimal passing score for each course final will be 80% with no re-take option. This excludes the comprehensive finals for PTA 102 and PTA 202.
- 3. The comprehensive finals for PTA 102 and PTA 202 require a minimal passing score of 75% with one re-take option for each course.

The program has assessed that all graduates from 2017 and 2018 who met the above criteria passed the NPTE on the first attempt.

I. Learning Resources

Are the learning resources adequate for the program/discipline teaching needs? Please provide comments.

The available space in the Ted Hill Physical Therapist Assistant building is adequate for the needs of the program. The program has one large room that serves as the classroom and lab area. Separate rooms adjoin the classroom that allow for equipment storage, lockers, and laundry needs. Another area of the building provides 4 spots for a computer lab. There are times when a second room could be used such as clinical skill checks. This is accomplished currently by the use of portable dividers. These work well to provide a visual divide, but are not effective for sound. The PTA program has utilized the simulation space at the Zetmeir building on occasion. We are exploring options on how to implement the use of the space in the future to enhance our student preparation.

J. Partnerships

To what extent has the program/discipline developed external partnerships?

The PTA program has developed relationships with a number of community partners who participate in our advisory board. The advisory board provides input on needed changes for the program.

The PTA program currently has 30 agreements in place with clinical sites in Kansas, Missouri, and Oklahoma. These sites accept our students to provide clinical training. Each site has a clinical instructor that works with our students for

the required 3, 4, or 6 week period depending on the clinical education course. These sites are not paid for the services they provide. The Clinical Coordinator and program director have worked hard to regain clinical sites after the termination of the 2016 class. Several sites were not receptive to accept LCC PTA based on prior experiences. Many of these sites have provided a second chance for our program. At this time, we are receiving positive feedback from all sites.

One of the strengths for the program is a very high demand in the nation for PTA's. PTA demand is predicted to grow by 30% by 2026. Demand for PTA's in the region remains steady. There are 4 other PTA programs in Kansas. Other PTA programs in the region, include location of Springfield, Missouri and Miami, Oklahoma. All of these programs, including LCC, have approximately the same class size capacity. Hutchinson Community college has a very similar class size, but has two cohorts per year. LCC offers the program for a few credit hours lower than most of the other programs. The LCC program is also one of the lower cost programs.

Additional strength of the program is the Ted Hill building that is designated for the PTA program. The program has very nice space and equipment. All of the current faculty are a great asset for the program as well. The faculty are motivated to provide high level education and work to motivate and work with students to help them to be high achievers. This has been validated by many of the clinical sites providing positive feedback to the program acknowledging the substantial improvements that have been noted by the clinicians in the region.

The program prepares the graduate to function as entry level PTA. The students are well prepared to successfully pass the nation exam. Upon successfully passing the national exam, the graduate will be able to acquire a license in any state. After a student acquires two years of post-license experience, they can apply for a bridge program that will allow them work to acquire a Doctoral degree in Physical Therapy.



Labette Community College affirms its commitment to promote the goals of fairness and equity in all aspects of educational enterprise. 
