

#### **Executive Summary**

(Include the major changes from previous program review.)

The Nursing program is one of the longest-standing programs at Labette Community College. The first cohort of nursing students graduated in 1970. As expected, the Nursing program has evolved and changed continuously over the years to keep abreast of advances in healthcare and the requirements of multiple accrediting organizations.

The most substantial change for the Nursing Program since the 2011 Program Review has been the move into the Zetmeir Health Science building. Moving the Nursing Program into this newly constructed state-of-the art facility has greatly expanded not only the physical space for the program but also the technology available to students. The Simulation Center and the two large classrooms equipped with student computers are the most significant advances in technology.

Other changes since the 2011 Program Review include updates in the curriculum (general education requirements only) and the program length (reduced from 72 credits to 66). These changes allow continued compliance with the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) standards and also comply with the Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR), the Kansas State Board of Nursing Practice Act, and the LCC catalog requirements for an AAS degree.

KBOR updated the ADN Program alignment outcomes in 2016 and the LCC Nursing program adapted the revised outcomes effective fall 2016. Course syllabi, the Student Nurse Handbook, and the Strategic Plan of Evaluation documents.

The final change made was the decision to accept College Algebra as the only math prerequisite for the program. Previously, students could complete either Applied Math or College Algebra.

As demonstrated by the list of strengths identified on page 22, the Nursing program is a strong and vital part of LCC and serves as the anchor for the Zetmeir Health Science building. The quality of LCC's Nursing program is recognized not only in Southeast Kansas but even state-wide and beyond.

Even a strong program has opportunities and challenges that must be addressed to continue the position of strength and success. Increasing student retention and improving first-time pass rates on both the NCLEX-RN and NCLEX-PN licensure exams are constant challenges as the level of difficulty on both licensure exams increases with each update.

The recruitment and retention of master's prepared faculty is also a challenge. It can be difficult to find qualified candidates who want to teach as their career in nursing. There are many lucrative career options within the nursing field for those with the advanced degree.

It is the recommendation of the Program Review Committee that the Nursing Program be continued.

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## ACADEMIC PROGRAM/DISCIPLINE REVIEW Labette Community College

#### Introduction to Program

The Labette Community College Nursing Program is a Bi-Level program. A Bi-Level (step-out-program) has one application process. The faculty teach PN and RN content from day one. The student can opt out of the RN program, take the National Council of State Boards of Nursing-Practical Nursing exam (NCLEX-PN®), and become licensed as a PN or they can matriculate though the entire program and take the National Council of State Boards of Nursing-Registered Nursing (NCLEX-RN®) to become licensed as a RN. This program is designed for career mobility for the Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) to transition into the role of the Registered Nurse (RN). Graduates are prepared to take both the Practical Nurse Licensure Exam and the Registered Nurse Licensure Exam. Under the Kansas Statewide Nursing Articulation Plan, LCC nursing graduates may also continue studies at colleges or universities that offer a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing. The LCC Nursing Program is distinguished for graduating competent, caring, and quality nurses.

The LCC Nursing Program uses a competitive admissions process and admits forty (40) generic students each fall into the first level of the program. The second level is approved for up to forty (40) students who either have successfully completed the first level of the program or are Articulating LPNs from other like nursing programs.

The LCC Nursing program complies with the Kansas statewide nursing articulation plan endorsed by Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN). The Council for Articulation in Kansas (CNAK Plan) is utilized to transition LPNs into the second level of the LCC Nursing Program. As space and faculty ratios allow, the LCC Nursing Program also welcomes transfer students from other nursing programs to complete their educational goals at LCC.

This program review will focus on students who have been accepted and are enrolled into the LCC Nursing Program. The nursing program is one of the largest student groups at LCC. Of the 163 health science students enrolled in the six (6) health care programs for the fall 2016 semester, seventy (70) or 43% of them are nursing program students.

In addition to the 70 students enrolled in the nursing program in the fall 2016, there are many students with a declared major of nursing who are enrolled in general education requirements for either the LCC Nursing Program or the Pre BSN degree option. For the fall 2016 semester, there are a total of 252 nursing declared majors enrolled at LCC. These declared nursing major students are generating 696 nursing course credit hours and 1,361 general education credit hours.

The Bi-Level Curriculum is comprised of twenty-five (25) or 38% general education credits and forty-one (41) or 62% nursing credits. This curriculum is in compliance with the Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) Associate Degree Nursing Alignment Plan, the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN), and the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN).

#### Major Changes from Previous Program Review

#### Curriculum and Program Length Change

In order to comply with the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) Standard 4 Curriculum and to ensure the program length is congruent with national guidelines and best practices, the nurse faculty made a motion on October 6, 2014 to drop Sociology and accept either Speech or

English Composition II. This decision took the total program length from 72 credits to 66 credits. This decision was approved by all nurse faculty members after an in-depth evaluation of the Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) ADN-Nurse Alignment, Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN) Nurse Practice Act, and LCC catalog requirements for an AAS degree. Sociology is not listed by KBOR as a nursing general education course and the ADN alignment allows the selection of either Speech or English Composition II. The nursing program will continue to encourage all students to take Sociology and both English Composition II and Speech to achieve the RN-to-BSN degree requirements. In addition to a decrease in overall program credit hours, the Nurse Faculty Organization voted to move NURS 124 Family Nursing I from the summer semester to the spring semester. This realignment in level I of the program will decrease the total number of semesters from six (6) to five (5), further accomplishing compliance with ACEN Standards and Criteria. The planned substantive change did not affect the core nursing courses or student learning outcomes for the program. The change merely affected the number and type of general education courses required to complete the AAS degree in Nursing at LCC.

#### Kansas Board of Regents (KBOR) 2016 ADN Program Alignment Outcomes

The Kansas Board of Regents updated the Associate Degree Nursing Program Outcomes as part of an overall alignment evaluation. The LCC Nursing program adapted the new 2016 ADN Program Outcomes to be effective in fall 2016 and have made the change in course syllabus, the Student Nurse Handbook, and in the Strategic Plan of Evaluation documents. In addition, the program will continue the use of the bi-level outcomes as well as current course outcomes for program evaluation.

#### Math

After an extensive evaluation and a comparative analysis by the program director and nurse faculty, the decision was made to remove the option of Applied Math as a math prerequisite for the bi-level program. College Algebra is the only math prerequisite accepted for the program.

#### A. Program Relation to College Mission, Core Values, and Strategic Plan

#### **Nursing Program Mission Statement**

LCC Nursing Program provides quality learning opportunities to prepare competent practical and associate degree nurses in a supportive environment for success in a changing world.

#### Nursing Program Purpose Statement

The purpose of the Nursing Program at LCC is to prepare practical nurses to provide health promotion interventions and care for clients in structured settings and to prepare professional associate degree nurses to practice culturally competent nursing care across the life span in all health care settings.

#### Nursing Program Philosophy

The nurse faculty believes that the nursing student studies the art and science of helping individuals, families, and the community to achieve optimal wellness. The nurse faculty creates an environment that is conducive to learning. It is the responsibility of the nurse faculty to keep current on evidence-based practice developments in nursing education and clinical practice, and to facilitate student learning and growth as professionals. In the process of promoting health, students use critical thinking to shape clinical decision-making in the application of the nursing process. An integral part of the nursing process is communication and the ability to teach clients how to care for themselves safely and effectively. As a manager of care, the student nurse prioritizes client needs according to Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs. Collaboration with other members of the health care team is necessary to achieve client outcomes. Practical nurses are educated to provide health promotion interventions and care for ill

clients experiencing low risk health needs in structured settings. Professional nurses are prepared to practice culturally competent nursing care across the lifespan for health care consumers with low risk or high-risk health needs, in community, institutional, acute care, rehabilitation, and critical care settings. It is the responsibility of each student to achieve academic excellence for the purpose of preparing him/herself to provide evidence-based nursing care in a changing health care environment. Graduates must be committed to engage in lifelong learning, adhere to principles of ethics and legal standards in the state in which they are licensed, and base their practice upon the American Nurse Association (ANA) Standards of Practice.

#### B. Program Recognition/Accreditation

The Practical Nursing (PN) program is approved by the Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN). The Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) program is approved by the KSBN and accredited by Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN), formally known as the National League of Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC).

#### C. Program/Discipline Demand/Need

The national median annual wage for registered nurses was \$67,490 in May 2015. The median annual wage for registered nurses in Southeast Kansas is \$41,360 in September 2016.

#### Anticipated Demand for Program Graduates:

Employment of registered nurses is projected to grow 16 percent from 2014 to 2024, much faster than the average for all occupations. Growth will occur for a number of reasons, including an increased emphasis on preventive care; growing rates of chronic conditions, such as diabetes and obesity; and demand for healthcare services from the baby-boom population, as they live longer and more active lives. (Data collected from U.S. Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics. Occupational Outlook Handbook 7/27/16.)

The national median annual wage for licensed practical nurses was \$43,170 in May 2015. The median annual wage for licensed practical nurses in Southeast Kansas is \$26,100 in September 2016.

Anticipated Demand for Program Graduates:

Employment of licensed practical nurses is projected to grow 16 percent from 2014 to 2024, much faster than the average for all occupations. As the baby-boom population ages, the overall need for healthcare services is expected to increase. LPNs will be needed in residential care facilities and in home health environments to care for older patients. (Data collected from U.S. Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics. Occupational Outlook Handbook 7/27/16.)

#### **Program Courses Transfer Options:**

- 1. Diagnostic Medical Sonography (DMS) program post LPN certification or RN License.
- 2. RN-to-BSN curriculum plans are available from most universities, which allow RN graduates to transfer their associate degree in nursing to a BSN track to complete their bachelor degree in nursing. LCC Nursing has specific curriculum alignment RN-to-BSN curriculum plans with Pittsburg State University and Kansas University. Newman University, Baker University, Ft. Hays University, Ottawa University, and Emporia State University actively recruit LCC Nursing graduates into their BSN programs.
- 3. Nursing Completion for ADN-to-BSN Track. This curriculum plan has been designed specifically by Pittsburg State University Irene Ransom Bradley School of Nursing to allow LCC ADN nursing students to be admitted and be enrolled into BSN level coursework at PSU while completing their Associate Degree at LCC. This partnership is scheduled to begin in fall 2016 with four (4) LCC nursing students participating in the curriculum plan. Upon graduation from LCC, these students can choose either a full-time or part-time option with PSU Nursing to complete their BSN degree.
- 4. Pre-BSN Associate in Science degree. This LCC degree is designed for those students who wish to complete bachelor degree general education requirements at a community college, and then transfer to a University to complete a generic BSN degree. Students who choose this curriculum plan are not admitted into the LCC nursing program, but are advised and provided guidance for their general education options.

#### D. Summary Statement of Faculty Qualifications

Qualified faculty and staff provide leadership and support necessary to attain the goals and outcomes of the nursing education unit. All full-time faculty meet the academic and professional requirements of Labette Community College (LCC), Kansas State Board of Nursing (KSBN), and Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN). As required by KSBN, all nurses attend a minimum of thirty (30) hours of approved continuing education every two years. All seven (7) full-time faculty have earned a Master in Nursing degree. The majority of the part-time nurse faculty are not credentialed with a master's degree in nursing. One (1) part-time nurse faculty member holds a bachelor's degree in nursing as the highest degree.

Adequate number of faculty ensure that clinical groups include ten (10) or fewer students. Theory class includes forty (40) or fewer students taught using the team teaching model. All nursing courses are taught by full-time nurse faculty.

#### 2. What recruiting and retention strategies are used by the program/discipline?

The program director and nurse faculty participate in recruitment and outreach activities throughout the year in community service and service-learning events. Events such as KU Camp Med, Children's Teddy Bear Clinic, High School Health Science Programs, Blood Drives, Flu shot and Blood Pressure Clinics, and Student Nurse Club are examples of ways the program reaches out to the community through service and learning. Additionally, the program works with the Public Relations Director to market the program through TV commercials, digital billboards, and printed brochures.

The Nursing Program has a specific retention/remediation policy to help retain students in the program. The following steps are used to ensure retention of nursing students in the program:

- ❖ The student and instructor become aware that the student has a problem with taking or passing exams.
- ❖ If the student has an exam grade below 80% an exam analysis must be completed with a nursing instructor. In addition, if the cumulative exam average is below 80% the student must complete 2 hours of study time at the college before the next scheduled exam. The next exam cannot be taken until the required study time/exam analysis is completed. The test make-up policy will be implemented for any exam not taken with the class.
- ❖ The student and instructor discuss the Summary of Exam techniques.
- ❖ The student and instructor review each question that the student missed on the exam. The student uses the exam techniques to answer these questions. (The student does not look at his/her former answer or at the correct answer on the answer key).
- ❖ The student and instructor identify the main category and specific problem or contributing factor for why the student missed each question.

- The instructor/student records why each item was missed on the exam analysis worksheet.
- The instructor/student totals the number of items missed and the percentages for each specific problem and each main category.
- Suggested interventions are developed with input from the student and recorded on the Suggestions to Improve Exam Performance checklist.
- A copy of the Student Remediation exam analysis is given to the student, and another is retained in the student's record.
- Follow-up appointments (or referrals) for help with exam skills, tutoring, counseling and evaluation of progress are made per student request.

## 4. Total number of program students sorted by main campus, concurrent, online, and Cherokee per year.

The nursing program has no distance education for the core curriculum courses, however the RedZone student learning system is utilized to strengthen content and allow for varied teaching strategies. All Nursing classes are offered on-ground on the main campus with the exception of NURS 207 Pathophysiology and NURS 116 Pharmacology for Health Care Professionals. NURS 207 is offered both on-ground and on-line and NURS 116 is offered only online. All core nursing curriculum courses have an off-campus clinical component.

## 5. Number of courses and percentage of courses taught by full-time and adjunct instructors in the discipline.

Full-time nurse faculty teach both in the classroom and the clinical setting. Adjunct faculty teach non-nursing program courses and clinical instructors teach in the clinical setting as needed. Preceptors are utilized in the final capstone nursing course for a total of twenty-four (24) hours. Nurse faculty accompany students to clinical setting as required by KSBN and ACEN for all other clinical experiences. Kansas State Board of Nursing defines a preceptor as a "registered professional nurse who is not employed by the nursing education program but who provides clinical supervision for professional nursing students in a nursing education program" (Kansas Nurse Practice Act 60-1-104a).

The Nursing Program also receives Carl Perkins funding used for acquisition of equipment and professional development. The 2016-2017 Perkins grant allocation for the Nursing Program is \$6009.00. In addition, the Perkins grant pays for the Nurse Tim webinar subscription service that is available for all Health Science faculty and adjunct instructors. The Kansas Nurse Initiative (KNI) grant, sponsored by Kansas Board of Regents designed to address the nursing shortage, has funded one-half (½) of one (1) nurse faculty salary for the past eight (8) years.

#### J. Learning Resources

Fiscal, physical, and learning resources promote the achievement of the goals and outcomes of the nursing education unit and are strengths of the program. The program has received financial support from the college, providing a stable budget in difficult economic times. The faculty are involved in the department budget process annually through program operational planning. The nursing program moved into the new Zetmeir Health Science building in spring 2014. Classrooms are well-equipped with current technology and furnishings. The Nursing Program considers itself privileged to have an extensive variety of current instructional aids, technology software, hardware, and technical support that promotes student learning and program outcomes. The program has a well-designed and equipped nursing skills lab and simulation center. The skills lab includes hospital beds and adult static manikins used for basic skill development. The simulation center is equipped with high-fidelity simulators that simulate medical emergencies and child birth for student learning opportunities. Patient simulation experiences include infant, pediatrics, adult, and women's health. The simulation center is utilized by all LCC Health Science programs and by community health care institutions to train staff members in uncommon but current health care patient situations.

#### K. Partnerships

Communities of interest have input into program process and decision making. Communities of interest work closely with the nursing program to meet the program outcomes. Communities of interest include area high schools, public health agencies, clinical agencies, program students, graduates, and members of the community. These representatives attend advisory committee meetings twice a year, providing their input into program changes and revisions. This committee is not a policy making committee but an information sharing group. Furthermore, the advisory committee also reviews the programs ongoing evaluation plan and data collection each year and is given the opportunity to provide input into the success of the program. Graduates have input into the program by completing an exit survey at the end of each level of the program. The surveys are collated and shared with nurse faculty, administration, and the nursing advisory committee.

Partnerships exist that promote excellence in nursing education, enhance the profession, and benefit the community. Partnerships that exist with the local clinical sites and community agencies are important. Competition for clinical sites is increasing; therefore, retention of the sites is imperative. Nurse faculty attend round-table discussions with clinical sites to discuss clinical rotations each academic year. The clinical site develops a spreadsheet document of all nursing programs and patient care units utilized by each school to ensure that nursing programs partner together and share the clinical space. All courses contain a Community Service and/or Service Learning Project that promote partnerships between the nursing program and the community. For example, in NURS 201 Mental Health Nursing, students partner with the Senior Center to present service-learning projects related to

depression in the elderly and in NURS 203 Family Nursing II, students work with community preschools to partner with well-child assessment, diabetic screenings, and present service-learning projects about hand washing to prevent the spread of disease.

In 2006 the nursing program joined with Pittsburg State University (PSU) nursing program and Ft. Scott Community College (FSCC) nursing program to form a partnership in simulation to capture Kansas Nursing Initiative Grant monies. PSU received \$1.4 million and developed a simulation center and purchased a site license for METI scenarios. The two community college nursing programs have access to the simulation center at PSU for student learning opportunities. In addition, the community college programs also have access to patient care scenarios from PSU.

The LCC Nursing Program has participated in the Kansas Board of Regents Nurse Initiative grant since 2007. This grant allows the program to fund one-half (½) of the salary of one (1) full-time nursing faculty position. The program continues to participate in the Carl Perkins Career Technology grants to promote excellence in education and enhance the profession of nursing. These grants allow the program to purchase evidence based student and faculty resources that promote the student learning and program outcomes.

In 2011, the LCC Nursing Program joined forces again with PSU and FSCC to develop the Southeast Kansas Nursing Education Collaboration to develop a pilot project creating learning modules that could be downloaded and used by any of the nursing programs. The project received Kansas State Board of Nursing approval. The initial modules were developed in mental health and are housed on the PSU's Angel learning system. All partners are looking forward to adding more modules as learning resources in the future.

LCC Nursing Program and Kansas University (KU) School of Nursing hold an articulation agreement that was signed by both schools on September 11, 2012. The University is accepting all of our curriculum courses and allowing the graduate to complete post-degree credits to complete general education courses at LCC. The RN LCC-graduate can then finish the BSN degree through KU with 30-35 hours that are all completed online.

Additionally, on October 12, 2012 the LCC Nursing Program began formal conversation with Pittsburg State University (PSU) School of Nursing to formulate a written articulation agreement for RN graduates at LCC to have the option to complete a RN-to-BSN degree closer to home. PSU is approximately 30 miles from the LCC campus.

# PRESIDENT'S RECOMMENDATION

That the Board of Trustees review Policy 3.23 Intellectual Property, Policy 3.24 Academic Freedom, and Policy 3.26 New Course or New Program Approval. We will request action to be taken at the November Board Meeting.

## POLICY 3.23

### INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

Labette Community College fosters an environment conducive to the creation, dissemination, discussion, and exploration of knowledge. To encourage the investment of time, thought, creativity, and energy in the development of academic works, including copyright, books, articles, works of art, musical compositions, and course materials, ownership of academic intellectual property resides with the creator.

This policy applies to all intellectual property related to academic works of faculty and students, except in the following circumstances:

- A. Works written or produced for grants or contracts that specify that ownership belong to the funding or contracting party or for College administrative software.
- B. Student-created products that are not claimed by students within 30 days of the close of the semester in which those products were created. After this period, these works belong to the institution except as noted in the course syllabus.
- C. If intellectual property developed at the College is commercialized by someone other than the College, the institution retains the right to control whether the institution's name or logo is displayed in association with the work and to require appropriate acknowledgment of institutional support of the creation of the work. The College should be notified of intent to commercialize use or affix the LCC logo or other related affiliation prior to any commercial agreements.
- D. If the creator was assigned, directed, or specifically funded by the College to develop the material, the institution can recover direct expenses related to the development of intellectual property from revenue subsequently collected by the creator.
- E. Unless otherwise agreed in writing prior to the creation of copyrightable material that is developed for College courses or curriculum, the creator may use the material for his/her own purpose after five years. However, the College will continue to have non-exclusive, royalty-free, use of the work and the ability to modify the work for its use within the institution so that the College's continued use of such material for educational purposes is not jeopardized.
- F. Mediated eCourseware shall not be sold, leased, rented or otherwise used in a manner that competes in a substantial way with the for-credit offering of Labette Community College while the creator is employed by this institution, unless that transaction has received the approval of the chief academic officer.
- G. This policy does not apply to intellectual property developed before this policy was formally approved.

If the College determines that any of the above exceptions apply, the creator of the intellectual property who disagrees with the determination may appeal the determination through the established grievance procedure outlined in the LCC policy and procedure manual.

### POLICY 3.24 ACADEMIC FREEDOM

Academic freedom in teaching is fundamental for the protection of faculty members' rights to teach and students' rights to learn. However, these rights are qualified and selected examples of such qualifications are presented below. The College endorses fully the statement on academic freedom in the 1940 Statement of Principles of the American Association of University Professors, and the following specifically:

The instructors of Labette Community College are entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to the adequate performance of his/her other academic duties. Research for pecuniary return should be based upon a written agreement understanding with the administration Chief Academic Officer-

The instructors of Labette Community College are entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing their subject, but they should be careful not to introduce into their teaching controversial matter that has no subject relevance.

The instructors of Labette Community College are citizens, members of a learned profession, and representatives of an educational institution. When they speak or write as citizens, they should be free from institutional censorship or discipline, but his/her special position in the community imposes special obligations. As scholars and professionals, they should remember that the public may judge their profession and their institution by their utterances. Hence, they should at all times endeavor to be accurate, should exercise appropriate restraint, and should show respect for the opinions of others. As private citizens, they should make every effort to indicate they are not speaking as representatives of LCC.

For sound androgogical reasons, faculty members may decide that it is necessary to use course materials that some students may find offensive. When these materials include explicit representations of human sexual acts or other graphic depictions that could reasonably be expected to be offensive to some students, a faculty member has an obligation to give students, in advance of the presentation, information sufficient to enable individual students to make a knowledgeable choice about whether or not to attend that class period. Where reasonable, the faculty member should provide reasonable accommodation to that student. Nonetheless, students remain responsible for learning class materials and for completing course requirements. If a course makes considerable use of such material throughout the semester, students should receive, no later than on the first day of class, information sufficient to enable each of them to make an informed decision about whether or not to take the course.

Appeals concerning academic freedom can be made through the established grievance procedure outlined in the LCC policy and procedure manual.

This policy is based on K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 71.601 which stipulates that the Kansas Board of Regents must approve courses for which credit hours are awarded in community colleges. This policy is based on K.S.A. 71-601 et seq., K.S.A. 71-1891 et seq., K.S.A. 72-4480 and K.S.A. 72-4482 which requires that the Kansas Board of Regents approve courses for which credit hours are awarded in community colleges. Further, this policy requires compliance with Chapter 71, Article 6 regarding the definition of credit hour level of courses (not to exceed course levels offered in universities at the sophomore level), standards for determining number of credit hours for courses (time-based standard or competency-based standard), and lastly that the local Board of Trustees shall direct the college President to develop a procedure to address quality issues and faculty involvement in the New Course or New Program Approval process.
